Message from the CEO & Board President



In 2017, we were both excited and humbled to celebrate our 30th anniversary of serving families in crisis, including those who were homeless or at risk of homelessness in Greater Nashua.

We are proud to say that since 1987 we have remained true to our original mission to provide tools and support to people in crisis so they can become self-sufficient. With that singular focus and strong community support, we have dramatically impacted the lives of nearly 125,000 adults and children in Greater Nashua over three decades.

Those who are involved in our daily efforts – be they staff, board members or donors— know that it's about much more than numbers, it's about the people we serve.

Our Agency has a positive and lasting impact on homeless young mothers and their children, the elderly who may be struggling on a fixed income or individuals facing an unexpected life crisis such as illness or a job loss.

Through our Transitional Housing, Housing Stability and Rapid ReHousing Programs, we continue to make a difference in helping families overcome poverty and secure and maintain their basic housing needs. A recent study from the New Hampshire Women's Foundation found that nearly 3 in 5 adults living in poverty in our state are female – pointing to a continued need for our Transitional Housing services. Throughout this report you will read about the direct and far-reaching impact we have on single mothers and their children — as the women are given the opportunity to pursue an education that leads to full-time employment.

This past year was a time to extend a heartfelt thank you and sincere good wishes to our Agency founder, the Reverend Dr. Robert "Odie" Odierna, who after 30 years of enthusiastic involvement, retired from our Board of Directors as well as from his pastoral duties at Church of the Good Shepherd in Nashua.

Under Odie's strong leadership, the Church was the driving force behind our origins as Nashua Pastoral Care Center 30 years ago. His non-stop dedication to our mission has motivated us day after day. In addition to being a true leader, Pastor Odie has been an inspiring mentor to many. You can read more about his contributions and a new scholarship fund in his honor on page 9.

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A Hopeful Future

"In a few years I went from being just a teen mom and struggling waitress—worried about where we would sleep next — to having a career and my own apartment." Jillian was just 19, alone and desperate with her one-year-old daughter Emily, when she first came to us for help. At the time, she thought her only option was to continue living in a motel with her daughter sleeping in a Pack 'n Play. "I was at the lowest point of my life and had lost hope for our future," says the single mother who was working two part-time waitressing jobs.

Sadly, Jillian grew up in a home where she was abused and lived in fear. After her daughter was born, she realized she had no choice but to leave in order to protect herself and her baby. She and Emily spent a year bouncing between a friend's couch and a motel until she found the Front Door Agency.

She entered our Transitional Housing Program and with the help of her case manager, Jillian began to set achievable goals and to pursue her dream to work in the dental field. "In a few years, I went from being just a teen mom and struggling waitress — worried about our safety and where we would sleep next — to being a college graduate with a career as an oral surgery assistant."

Stabilize, Transform and Flourish

Our Transitional Housing Program Changes Lives Through Education.

The Front Door Agency provides single mothers and their children with affordable housing options and comprehensive support services. Our three-phase Transitional Housing Program emphasizes life skills and education as the key to breaking the cycle of poverty.

Young women (ages 18-35) come to us in crisis brought on by domestic violence, substance abuse or other serious issues. Many have no reliable family to reach out to for assistance.

We offer the tools and support necessary to transform their lives so they can provide for their own families and ultimately give back to the community.

63% of women in our Transitional Housing Program graduated from a job skills training program, earned a professional certificate or completed a secondary education program.

Client Successes



Katie earned an LNA license and currently works two part-time jobs. She has successfully graduated to the "Flourishing" phase of our program.

Helen graduated from a medical coding and billing program and secured full-time employment with benefits. She and her family will be the recipients of a Greater Nashua Habitat for Humanity home in March 2018.




Samantha graduated from our program with a full-time job in health and human services that allows her to pay market rent. Her son is thriving.

POVERTY HITS SINGLE MOMS HARDEST





Our Integrated Programs Improve Lives.

Prevention & Intervention of Homelessness

The Front Door Agency provides one-time or short-term assistance with rent, mortgage payments or utilities for individuals and families in crisis.

Outcomes: Nearly 70% of those receiving assistance were able to remain in their homes and stay current on their rent and utilities for at least one year after receiving help.

Rapid Rehousing

Funded by federal grant monies, this program is targeted to people who are already homeless or in imminent danger of becoming homeless. The Front Door Agency works quickly to stabilize the individual or family, helps them to find affordable housing and provides direct financial support and intensive case management for up to 9 months.

Outcomes: In fiscal year 2017, we stabilized 8 families and provided \$30,000 in direct rental subsidies. Seven of those families are still in their own homes today and are working and paying their own rent or mortgage.

Holiday Wishes

With generous community support, the Front Door provides toys and warm clothing for children in need during the holidays. Partner organizations like BAE Systems, Church of the Good Shepherd and many others are instrumental in the success of this program.

Outcomes: We brought happy holidays to 1,041 children in fiscal year 2017.



Crisis Advocacy & Resource Education (CARE)

Our Agency offers assistance with car repairs, medical and dental expenses and other basic needs to qualified applicants in financial crisis — making it easier for them to stay working.



Working Together With Partners to Improve Financial Literacy

We were pleased to partner for the first time this year with Budget Buddies, a Lowell-based non-profit, to offer more intensive financial education to our female clients. Each woman meets one-on-one with a financial mentor for six months, enabling her to set and achieve individual financial goals.

The Front Door also offers a five-week basic Financial Literacy Program free to the community, twice each year. Beginning in 2017, Santander Bank became our key partner in funding and presenting the program. The YMCA of Greater Nashua in Merrimack offered us free space and childcare, removing some challenges the program previously faced.

88% of Transitional Housing participants gained employment.



70% of families receiving assistance with rent and utilities were able to remain in their homes.

86% increased their benefits and income.


82% of clients receiving a security deposit loan were still in permanent housing one year later.



Our Endowment

The Front Door Agency's endowment fund began with an unexpected bequest from a kind donor. She was touched by the Agency's ability to transform lives by giving a hands-up opportunity to families.

Of the utmost importance, the unrestricted endowment started by this kind donor provides the Agency with the resources to support current operations if needed, respond to opportunities for growth, and adapt to future needs.

Most recently the endowment has helped with much-needed repairs at our Vine Street
Transitional Housing property known as Victory
House. We first acquired and updated the now 117year-old building in 1999 with endowment funds.
Since then the five apartments and fenced-in play
yard have had heavy use and are showing serious
signs of deterioration. After careful study, a major
renovation was undertaken beginning in early
2017.

To date, renovations completed include replacement of the roof, replacement of six hot

water and boiler systems to new energy efficient combo systems; replacement of two decks and flooring to include structural supports to two units. Phase II of the project will include significant renovations to the windows, bathrooms and kitchens.

This critical housing facility is designed to meet the needs of Front Door Agency mothers who are pursuing their education while working and caring for their children. They have completed the stabilization phase of our program and are now living more independently in the transformational phase under the guidance of case workers while living in safe housing.

ur clients include young moms like Tracy—with no family to turn to as she fled domestic violence with her two-year-old son—who is now pursuing a business degree. Our Endowment Fund brings hope to families like Tracy's who are in crisis and turn to us for help.
